Gov. Barbour Declares Oct. 15 Mississippi Coastal Cleanup Day

Volunteers in Hancock, Harrison and Jackson counties are needed for the 23rd annual Mississippi Coastal Cleanup to be held from 8 a.m. – 11 a.m., Saturday, Oct. 15, in conjunction with the International Coastal Cleanup—the world’s largest volunteer cleanup effort on behalf of the marine environment. Gov. Haley Barbour recently signed a proclamation in support of the annual event organized by the Mississippi Department of Marine Resources and the Mississippi Marine Debris Task Force.

“Keeping our coastline clean and litter free is essential to protecting our marine wildlife and coastal wetlands,” Governor Haley Barbour said. “The Mississippi Sound plays a vital role in our state’s economy, especially through tourism. I know the 23rd annual Mississippi Coastal Cleanup will be a great success.”

In addition, the Mississippi Coastal Cleanup will continue its partnership with Mississippi Power’s Renew Our Rivers program. The four-day Renew Our Rivers cleanup event will begin Wednesday, Oct. 12, and will culminate in conjunction with the Mississippi Coastal Cleanup on Saturday, Oct. 15.

Registration deadline for the Mississippi Coastal Cleanup is Oct. 3. Register online at www.mscoastalcleanup.org, or to obtain a registration form and sign up to volunteer call: 467-9048 in Hancock County; 214-1405 in Harrison County; 938-6612 in Jackson County; and 875-9057 for the Barrier Islands.

On cleanup day, zone captains will be stationed at each cleanup site in bright yellow T-shirts to direct volunteers and give them supplies such as trash bags, data cards to record the debris collected, as well as bottled water compliments of the Beverage Association of Mississippi, and a free fold-away tote provided by Chevron Pascagoula Refinery (while supplies last). Following the cleanup, volunteers must present their meal ticket at Courthouse Road Pier parking area on Highway 90 in Gulfport where they will enjoy a free lunch courtesy of the Gulf Coast Restaurant Group **from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. only** on event day.

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In Jackson County, lunch for volunteers will be held at the Estuarine Education Center at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College in Gautier between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. only the day of the event compliments of The Shed Barbeque & Blues Joint. Volunteers in Hancock County are invited for hotdogs and drinks starting at 11 a.m. at the Bay St. Louis Depot, courtesy of the Office of Congressman Steven Palazzo, the Bay St. Louis Rotary Club and BB's Snowballs.

During the 2010 International Coastal Cleanup, more than 600,000 volunteers in 108 countries removed more than 8 million pounds of debris from the ocean, rivers, lakes and waterways.

“Last year the cleanup expanded its efforts to include inland areas and waters since litter tossed upstream makes its way into the Sound and onto our beaches,” Lauren Thompson, state coordinator for the Mississippi Coastal cleanup, said. “In Mississippi, about 2,000 volunteers pitched in and removed 70 tons of trash from 55 sites along the shoreline and coastal waterways as part of the 2010 International Coastal Cleanup.”





WHEREAS, over the past 22 years, volunteers have collected more than 1.5 million pounds of debris from Mississippi's coastal waterways and shorelines; and

WHEREAS, Governor Barbour presented the Mississippi Marine Debris Task Force with a Governor's Take Pride Appreciation Award in 2004 for its work organizing and sponsoring the annual Mississippi Coastal Cleanup; and

WHEREAS, the Mississippi Marine Debris Task Force looks forward to a productive event in 2011 that will benefit the environment and educate the public about the importance of being good stewards of our coastal resources:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, hereby proclaim October 15, 2011, as

MISSISSIPPI COASTAL CLEANUP DAY

in the State of Mississippi.
