

# Coastal Preserves Activity Update 2022

- Invasive Species control
  - Giant and Common Salvinia
    - 78 spray missions
    - 390 miles within 20 different waterways
  - Giant Applesnail
    - 26,800 Snails Captured
    - 37,800 Egg Masses Destroyed
    - 5,600 miles of shoreline surveyed
  - Feral Hogs
    - 446 Hogs removed/killed on Coastal Preserve sites
  - Cogongrass, Chinese Tallow, Cherokee Rose, Japanese Climbing Fern, Chinese Privet is actively controlled and sprayed on 8 preserve sites.

## Coastal Preserves Activity Update 2022

- Trail Maintenance
  - 12 miles of trail mowed, maintained, and cleared
- Mechanical Clearing
  - 14 Acres cleared within 3 preserves
- Multiple outreach activities including:
  - Booth at the invasive species awareness event at the MS Aquarium
  - Summer Camp talks on Deer Island
  - Gulfport School district conservation talk

# Coastal Preserves Activity Update 2022

- Land Acquisitions
  - Approx 980 acres of marsh, wet pine forest, and maritime forest in Bay St. Louis, MS
- Tree Planting
  - Approximately 2000 pine trees on Deer Island BU site
- Future Projects
  - Prescribed burns on multiple preserve areas
  - Logging/Timber harvesting on 5 preserves
  - Larger Scale invasive species treatment on multiple preserves
  - Updated Kiosks




- Location: The Mississippi Sound
   7 miles south of Pass Christian
   5.5 miles west of Cat Island
- Use District: (G) General Use District

Agent: Anchor QEA

### **Project Description**

- Impacts
  - Fill of 900 acres of unvegetated waterbottoms
  - Dredging of 917,000 cubic yards from inside the project footprint to create 28,000 linear feet of containment berms
  - Overlay the sediment berm with 528,000 cubic yards of armor stone
    - Berm crest 5 feet mean lower low water (MLLW)
    - Berm crest width–15 feet
    - Berm base width maximum of 135 feet
  - Construction of marsh with dredged material
    - Elevations ranging from -0.5 to 3.0 feet MLLW
  - Requesting a 10-year permit

- b) Coastal Wetlands Use Plan...
  - The proposed project is allowable within the General Use District but the applicant is requesting a change to the Coastal Wetlands Use Plan in the footprint of the proposed project to a Special Use District: S-6 for Restoration and Enhancement Areas
  - Justified under Miss. Admin. Code Title 22, Part 23 (MS Coastal Program), Chapter 7, Section 105.06.01 and 105.06.02
    - There is a significant public benefit
    - Impacts to public access and adverse environmental impacts have been minimized
    - The general public and governmental entities were notified of the project
    - A public hearing was held

### **Applicable Decision Factors**

- c) Variance to the MS Coastal Program...
  - Miss. Admin Code Title 22, Part 23 (MS Coastal Program), Chapter 8, Section 114.01
    - "Permanent filling of coastal wetlands below the mean high tide line because of potential adverse and cumulative environmental impacts is not authorized."
  - Justified under Miss Admin Code Title 22, Part 23 (MS Coastal Program), Chapter 8, Section 118.04
    - Impacts to Coastal Wetlands would be no worse than if the guidelines were followed
      - Creating 820 acres of marsh habitat
      - Supplying a Beneficial Use (BU) site in the western Mississippi Sound

    - Notification of the project appeared in the Sun Herald on September 25, October 2, and October 9, 2022 and a public hearing was held on October 19, 2022
      - No public comments were received
  - MS DEQ: No comments were received
  - MS DAH: No objections
  - MS SOS: No objections
  - MS DWFP: No comments were received

#### **Staff Recommendation**

- The staff of the Department of Marine Resources has conducted a thorough evaluation of the project and has made findings on the decision factors in accordance with the Mississippi Coastal Program (MCP). Based on the results of these findings, it has been determined that the project is consistent with the MCP because it serves a higher public purpose.
  - Creation of 820 acres of marsh habitat
  - Providing a Beneficial Use (BU) site in western Mississippi Sound
- Staff requests a motion that the Commission recommend to the Executive Director:
  - Approve the Requested Variance
  - Approve the Use Plan Change
  - Approve the Permit as Requested




### Tidelands Trust Fund FY2024 Proposal Results



Appropriated for FY2023: \$12,455,247


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#### Public Access Awards FY2023

## Mississippi Spotted Seatrout Stock Assessment


### Background

- Initial draft completed in early 2022 by the Mississippi Stock Assessment Panel
- The panel is comprised of staff from MDMR and the Gulf Coast Research Laboratory
- Completed internal MDMR review and sent for peer-review
- Final analysis and edits completed in October 2022

## Model Used for Informing Management Decisions

- Presently accepted on a peer reviewed level and models identified as best available science
- Assessment was completed using SS3, which is widely used in SEDAR assessments for federally managed species
- This model included a re-evaluation of harvest estimates for 2016, due to findings during an examination of the time series


### %SPR




Time series of %SPR for the Mississippi SST stock

### %SPR Discussion


- Shifts in relative abundance and fishing pressure drive fishing mortality estimates
- These drivers lead to fluctuations in %SPR values observed in this assessment
  - Five-year average 22.1%
  - Terminal year 20.3%
- While positive trends were observed, we are continuing to examine the IOA and harvest estimates for the coming year





### Summary

- The pattern observed in %SPR for this assessment is overall positive but we will continue to examine the IOA in coming years
- Current 20% SPR target will likely continue to maintain or increase SST population at current harvest and effort levels
- Peer review was positive, with multiple constructive comments on how to improve data compilation and the assessment model
- Staff have recommended status quo for the fishery, as impacts from recent year's events must continue to be evaluated
