## Actions Update for November 21, 2023 Commission Meeting

### Discussed at the October 2023 meeting:

- The Commission recommended and the Director approved the following motions:
- Motion to recommend approval of variance and permit:
  - 1) The Jackson County Board of Supervisors' request for variance and permit requesting authorization to dredge an unnamed tributary to Bayou Porteaux near Solano Circle in Jackson County, Mississippi.

Approval of the permit is contingent upon:

- The use of turbidity curtains when a 10-ft buffer cannot be maintained between the dredging area and the SAV.
- Dredged material is made available for a beneficial use through MDMR's Beneficial Use of Dredged Material Program.





### Historical Crab Trap Closure Dates

- §49-15-84.1 Closed season for use of crab traps; removal of abandoned traps.
  - Closure must be no less than 10 days and no more than 30 days
  - Any trap remaining after 7<sup>th</sup> day of closure considered abandoned
- Closure dates will be selected based on:
  - Stakeholder feedback
  - Improving volunteer participation
  - Tidal cycle

### Proposed Closure Dates and Clean-up Logistics

- Proposed crab trap closure for all territorial waters within one-half mile of the mainland shoreline for 10 days between January 1<sup>st</sup> and March 31<sup>st</sup>
- Crab fishermen would have first seven days of closure to remove their own traps from the closed waters
- Derelict trap removal would be allowed by volunteers during the last 3 days of the 10-day closure
- All licensed crab fishermen will be notified ahead of closure by postcard mail-outs, legal notice, press release and social media posts
- Trap drop-off sites will be located at Bayou Caddy, Ocean Springs Harbor, and Pascagoula Point Park
- All recovered traps will be recycled

### 2021 MISSISSIPPI DERELICT CRAB TRAP REMOVAL PROGRAM

### NOTICE

### **JANUARY 21-31**

The Mississippi Department of Marine Resources (MDMR) will conduct a crab trap gear closure from Thursday, January 21, at 6 a.m. until Sunday, January 31, at 6 a.m. The closure area will be defined as all waters lecoted within one-half mile of the mainland shoreline to include Deer Island and all bays, bayous and rivers. State waters beyond the one-half mile will remain open.

During the first seven days, crob fishermen may remove their own traps from closure areas. Crob traps remaining in the water after Wednesday, January 27, are considered derelict. Derelict traps will be removed Thursday, January 28, through Saturday, January 30, and properly disposed at designated sites.

REMINDER: IT IS ILLEGAL TO REMOVE TRAPS NOT LICENSED TO YOU OUTSIDE OF THE APPROVED TRAP REMOVAL DATES. THIS WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED.

### MDMR announces crab trap closure January 21-31

BILOXI, Miss. – In an effort to remove derelict crab traps from state waters, the Mississippi Department of Manine Resources (MDMR) will conduct a crab trap closure for commercial and recreational craft fishermen in Mississippi retrinoil waters within one-half mile of the mainland shoreline and Deer Island from the Alabama/Mississippi border to the Mississippi/Louisiana border. The closure will run from 6 a.m. Thursday, Jan. 21, until 6 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 31, 2021.

The schedule for the removal of crab traps is as follows

- Jan. 21 27 All commercial and recreational crab fishermen must use this time
  to remove their own traps from closure areas in Mississippi territorial waters. As a
  reminder, it is illegal to remove traps licensed to another person outside of the
  approved trap removal dates. This will be strictly enforced.
- Jan. 28 30 All traps remaining in the water will be considered dereixt and will be removed and recycled. Volunteers may remove remaining traps from all state waters during these dates. Dereixt traps may be dropped off at MDMR designated sites for recycling from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. at Point Park in Pascagoula, Ocean Sorinos Harbor and Pleasure Street Boat Launch in Bay St. Louis.
- Jan. 31 Beginning at 6 a.m., all active traps may be returned to Mississippi territorial waters and crab fishing may resume.

The Mississippi Derelict Crab Trap Removal Program has removed and recycled almost 22,000 traps since its inception in 1999. Volunteers interested in participating in this year's program can contact the MDMR Shrimp and Crab Bureau at (228) 374-5000 for more information.

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### Staff recommendation:

For the Executive Director to establish a crab trap closure in public waters for the purpose of conducting a derelict crab trap clean-up for 10 days in 2024. Closure area and dates will be based on stakeholder feedback.





### Regulatory Changes to Title 22 Part 09 – Offshore Landing Permit

### Background

- Current MRIP FES design
  - Address based
  - Multiple limitations
- Management need
  - Removals are of utmost importance to understand regulatory effectiveness, angler success, and trends in fisheries over time
  - Recreational harvest estimates scale productivity in assessments
- Primary goal
  - Create a universe of offshore anglers to aid in the estimation of effort and harvest of offshore/federally managed species pertinent to Mississippi
- States currently employing similar efforts
  - LA, AL, FL

### Direct Use of Offshore Landing Permit

- Implementation of pilot recreational survey MS Creel
  - Modeled after LA Creel
  - Effort estimates derived from call-outs and emails to license frame
  - Pilot begins January 2024
  - Full implementation potentially 2025
- Important next steps
  - Stakeholder engagement/awareness
  - Planned comparisons and analyses
  - Transitioning all recreational time series

### Title 22 Part 9 Chapter 8 Recreational Reporting Requirements

Rule 8.4 Recreational Offshore Landing Permit. Any person, except those persons currently exempt from purchasing a recreational fishing license, possessing any one of the below fish species or species groups on board a vessel taken from within or outside of Mississippi territorial waters shall be required to have obtained and have in their immediate possession a recreational offshore landing permit. Any person on a trip aboard a charter vessel, who pays a fee for that trip, is not required to have this permit, but the permit is required for owner of the licensed charter vessel. Permits may be obtained at no cost from the Department, or authorized method, by persons who hold any valid license authorizing the taking and possessing of saltwater species of fish. Permits shall be valid for the duration of the calendar year in which they were purchased, regardless of the duration of the valid recreational fishing license. Required species are as listed:

### A. Reef fish species:

- 1. any species of snapper, excluding Mangrove Snapper harvested within a line formed by the Intercoastal Waterway;
- 2. Any species of amberjack;
- 3. Any species of grouper or hind;
- 4. Gray triggerfish;

### B. Coastal pelagics:

1. Cobia
